Data Analysis & Visualization Software

Microsoft Excel

For basic statistical analysis and charts, Excel is a powerful tool that most of us already have in our toolkit. Take the time to learn how to use pivot tables and functions.

SPSS

Probably the most ubiquitous software for sophisticated statistical analysis of data. Often available through an institutional license. <u>https://www.ibm.com/analytics/us/en/technology/spss/</u>

Tableau

Data visualization software. Offers free and paid versions; fully functional desktop software, but free version only allows sharing through Tableau Public server. <u>https://www.tableau.com/</u>

Dedoose

Inexpensive, web-based software for qualitative data analysis. http://www.dedoose.com/

nVIVO

Software for qualitative data analysis. Pricey, but many institutions have licensed it. <u>http://www.qsrinternational.com/product</u>

Voyant Tools

Free, web-based environment for analyzing and visualizing digital texts. <u>https://voyant-tools.org/</u> TAPoR (<u>http://tapor.ca/home</u>) is the updated and expanded version, but requires login.
