

The Nethergrim, now awoken and free to wreak its evil upon the world. One ambitious lord, eager for the chance to conquer and rule, succumbs to temptation and helps to free the Skeleth—eerie, otherworldly beings said to be unstoppable in battle. The Skeleth merge with the bodies of their victims, ruling their minds and turning them into remorseless killers. Worse yet, to kill the man inside the Skeleth only frees it to seize a new host, starting a cycle of violence that has no end.





The day Father disappears from Ferenwood he takes nothing but a ruler with him. But it's been almost three years since then, and Alice is determined to find him. She loves her father even more than she loves adventure, and she's about to embark on one to find the other. On her quest to find Father Alice must first find herself—and hold fast to the magic of love in the face of loss.



Quiet Power by Susan Cain – Puffin Canada – 978-0-671-06823-4 – Hardcover - \$23.99 – Non-Fiction – May 2016 – 288 pages - Ages 10 and up

The original book focused on the workplace; this book focuses on kids--school, extracurriculars, family life, and friendship. It also features Susan Cain's own story. There's even a guide at the end of the book for parents and teachers. This insightful, accessible, and empowering book, illustrated with amusing comic-style art, will be eye-opening to extroverts and introverts alike.



Shooter by Caroline Pignat — Razorbill Canada - 978-0-14-318757-8 — Hardcover - \$23.99 — Fiction — May 2016 — 400 pages - Ages 12 and up

A lockdown catches five grade 12 students by surprise and throws them together in the only unlocked room on that empty third floor wing: the boys' washroom. Told in five unique voices through prose, poetry, text messages, journals, and homework assignments, each student reveals pieces of their true story as they wait for the drill to end.



The Glittering Court by Richelle Mead – Razorbill – 978-1-595-14841-4 – Hardcover - \$24.99 – Fiction – April 2016 – 400 pages – Ages 12 and up


Big and sweeping, spanning the refined palaces of Osfrid to the gold dust and untamed forests of Adoria, The Glittering Court tells the story of Adelaide, an Osfridian countess who poses as her servant to escape an arranged marriage and start a new life in Adoria, the New World. But to do that, she must join the Glittering Court.



The Reader by Trace Chee – Putnam – 978-0-399-17677-7 – Hardcover - \$24.99 – Fiction – September 2016 - 448 pages – Ages 12 and up

Sefia knows what it means to survive. After her father is brutally murdered, she flees into the wilderness with her aunt Nin, who teaches her to hunt, track, and steal. But when Nin is kidnapped, leaving Sefia completely alone, none of her survival skills can help her discover where Nin's been taken, or if she's even alive. The only clue to both her aunt's disappearance and her father's murder is the odd rectangular object her father left behind, an object she comes to realize is a book—a marvelous item unheard of in her otherwise illiterate society. With the help of this book, and the aid

of a mysterious stranger with dark secrets of his own, Sefia sets out to rescue her aunt and find out what really happened the day her father was killed—and punish the people responsible.



Mirror in the Sky by Aditi Khorana – Razorbill – 978-1-595-14856-8 – Hardcover - \$23.99 – Fiction – June 2016 – 352 pages – Ages 12 and up

For Tara Krishnan, navigating Brierly, the academically rigorous prep school she attends on scholarship, feels overwhelming and impossible. Her junior year begins in the wake of a startling discovery: A message from an alternate Earth, light years away, is intercepted by NASA. This means that on another planet, there is another version of Tara, a Tara who could be living better, burning brighter, because of tiny differences in her choices. The world lights up with the knowledge of Terra

Nova, the mirror planet, and Tara's life on Earth begins to change.



Outrun the Moon by Stacey Lee – Putnam – 978-0-399-17541-1 – Hardcover - \$23.99 – Fiction – May 2016 – 400 pages – Ages 12 and up

San Francisco, 1906: Fifteen-year-old Mercy Wong is determined to break from the poverty in Chinatown, and an education at St. Clare's School for Girls is her best hope. Although St. Clare's is off-limits to all but the wealthiest white girls, Mercy gains admittance through a mix of cunning and a little bribery, only to discover that getting in was the easiest part. Not to be undone by a bunch of spoiled heiresses, Mercy stands strong—until disaster strikes.



Highly Illogical Behavior by John Corey Whaley – Dial Books – 978-0-525-42818-3 – Hardcover - \$23.99 – Fiction – May 2016 – 240 pages – Ages 14 and up

Sixteen-year-old Solomon is agoraphobic. He hasn't left the house in three years, which is fine by him. Ambitious Lisa desperately wants to get into the second-best psychology program for college (she's being realistic). But how can she prove she deserves a spot there? Solomon is the answer. Determined to "fix" Sol, Lisa thrusts herself into his life, introducing him to her charming boyfriend Clark and confiding her fears in him. Soon, all three teens are far closer than they thought they'd be,

and when their facades fall down, their friendships threaten to collapse, as well.



Dreamers Often Lie by Jacqueline West – Dial Books – 978-0-80373863-8 – Hardcover - \$23.99 – Fiction – April 2016 – 368 pages – Ages 12 and up

Jaye wakes up in the hospital, disoriented, and beset by a slippery morphing of reality into something else. Determined to get back to school and back to A Midsummer Night's Dream, in which she's starring, she lies to her sister, her mom, and her doctors—she's fine, she says. Jaye begins to notice unnerving similarities between her circumstances and those of some of Shakespeare's most famous plays. As things escalate to a frightening pitch, how much of what's happening is real, how much is in

Jaye's head, and how much does it matter as she's hurtling toward a fateful end over which she seems to have no control?



Rocks Fall Everyone Dies by Lindsay Ribar – Kathy Dawson Books – 978-0-525-42868-8 – Hardcover – \$23.99 - Fiction – June 2016-320 pages – Ages 12 and up

A paranormal suspense novel about a boy who can reach inside people and steal their innermost things—fears, memories, scars, even love—and his family's secret ritual that for centuries has kept the cliff above their small town from collapsing.





Seventeen sheep plus one Gus means that life is never dull on the farm! More pet antics: *I Won a What?*, *Who Wants a Tortoise?*, *If I Had a Gryphon*.



Mango & Bambang: The Not-a-Pig (Book One) by Polly Faber, illustrated by Clara Vulliamy – Candlewick – 9780763682262 -- \$14.99HC – Fiction -- 144 pages -- June 2016 – Ages 7-10 Mango Allsorts is good at all sorts of things, not just karate and chess. Bambang is most definitely not-a-pig and is now lost in a very busy city. When the two unexpectedly meet, a friendship begins. Bambang requires a great deal of coaxing and comforting to help him acclimate to the big city, and Mango is just the girl for the job. But when Mango faces a nerve-racking challenge of her own, will Bambang be able to return



Being a girl is not so easy when you look like a boy, especially in the eighth grade. Dunkin Dorfman, born Norbert Dorfman, is new in town and dealing with bipolar disorder and a painful secret. When they meet, their lives change dramatically. Other kids dealing with differences: *Not As We Know It, This is Not the Abby Show, Being Jazz.*


